ABOUT ART ON THE MOVE



ART ON THE MOVE is Western Australian's sole organisation dedicated to touring visual art exhibitions throughout the regions, interstate and beyond. We work towards the development of a diverse, connected, and thriving arts sector throughout WA and beyond that contributes to community wellbeing and economic prosperity.

In addition to our touring exhibitions and engagement programs, we support the sector through advocacy, capacity building and opportunities for creative and professional development. We champion artists and galleries for the essential role they play in enriching Australian cultural life, creating opportunities for education, reflection, and exchange.





ABOUT OUR TOURING EXHIBITION PROGRAM

We aim to present a program of exhibitions that reflect the diversity and complexity of Western Australia's cultures, places, and people.

We build this program from a combination of internally developed projects, organisational partnerships and exhibitions selected through a public Expression of Interest (EOI) process opened every two years. Applications submitted to our EOI program are assessed by an expert panel including ART ON THE MOVE staff and industry peers. From this process we may also identify projects for Creative Development or for other opportunities outside of the Touring Program.

COST SHARE

Receiving venues pay a one-off loan fee to receive an exhibition. Standard loan fees are \$4,500 for non-members and \$4,000 for members, but loan fees may vary depending on the scale and complexity of the exhibition. The average in-kind value of an ART ON THE MOVE touring exhibition to a receiving venue per booking is approximately \$15,000. Regardless of the length of time you book the exhibition, the fee does not vary.

TOUR MANAGEMENT

As Tour Managers, ART ON THE MOVE:

Crate and Package To international museum quality standards.

Manage Touring Logistics Bookings, loan agreements, freight delivery and pickup.

Industry Standard Documentation Condition reports and installation manuals and interpretation materials including a catalogue and didactic labels.

Learning and Engagement Programs Works with artists, curators and venues to produce a Learning and Engagement program that complements the exhibition.

Marketing Kit

Provides marketing and communication resources and support.

At ART ON THE MOVE, we offer our community creative ways to engage with art, fostering deep connections and encouraging new ways of looking at the world and participating in contemporary cultural and artistic communities.

We work with a diverse group of artists across our programs and develop activities in partnership with creative organisations across industries to build and share knowledge, and to develop and grow a wide variety of audiences for the arts in Western Australia.

Inspired by the artists we tour, and inviting the widest range of participants, we work to offer a range of inclusive events and activities that reflect the diversity of the communities we live in and art forms that exist with the aim of sharing and shaping the possibilities for positive impact creativity can have in our lives in a rapidly changing world.

Our programs include large scale events, workshops, artist talks, tours, longer term artist residencies and projects as well as online activities and resources. Our learning programs are for everyone. They take place in the galleries, in the community and online.

Throughout 2023, our Learning and Engagement team facilitated a range of free to public activities complementing our exhibition program, including:

- Portrait Drawing Workshops with Illona McGuire, and the Kalbarri Skywalk with Nanda Elder Colleen Drage and daughter Mauretta Drage, deepening connections to the themes and processes used within *He is Myself: The Art of Nyaparu William Gardiner;*
- Susie Vickery delivered a series of workshops concentrating on textile and stitch techniques alongside her exhibition, Peregrinations of a Citizen Botanist;
- In collaboration with Maker and Smith, ART ON THE MOVE screened a "best of" from the Makers Film Festival at the Geraldton Regional Gallery featuring artist Susie Vickery of Peregrinations of a Citizen Botanist;
- Painting and punch needle workshops with artists Desmond Taylor and Mariaan Pugh for their exhibition, Jila Kujarra: Two Snakes Dreaming;
- Artist Trevor Richards led workshop participants through his tape-painting techniques, and installed public mural works at Collie Art Gallery, and Katanning Art Gallery for his exhibition, *Roll the Tape*.

NYAPARU (WILLIAM) GARDINER: HE IS MYSELF: THE ART OF NYAPARU (WILLIAM) GARDINER Available until May 2024

Born in the years leading up to Australia's first Aboriginal workers' strike of 1946-1949. Mr. Gardiner (1943-2018) lived, worked and raised a family in the country's remote north west regions. Engaged in both pastoral life and mining-two industries that have driven the nation's wealth over the past century-Mr. Gardiner experienced firsthand a period of burgeoning Aboriginal political selfdetermination, through his association with the iconic Pilbara-based 'Strelley Mob'. He is Myself: The Art of Nyaparu (William) Gardiner presents more than 50 artworks created by Mr. Gardiner during the last four years of his life at Spinifex Hill Studio in South Hedland, including many previously unseen works.

Curated and produced by FORM and made possible through the Regional Exhibition Touring Boost, this exhibition offers an exceptional insight into the fascinating life of a man who, through his travels and experiences, embodies an era of unprecedented social and economic change for Western Australia and its Aboriginal peoples.

THE ALTERNATIVE ARCHIVE

Available until July 2024

The Alternative Archive is a survey exhibition featuring the works of 28 contemporary artists selected from a series of regionally based exhibitions facilitated by local curators, offering a rare insight into the diversity of regional arts practice throughout the state.

Co-curated by John Curtin Gallery Director Chris Malcolm and Independent Curator/ Artist Anna Louise Richardson, *The Alternative Archive* aims to increase understanding of the arts ecology, the practices and conditions of regional art making in Western Australia. Made possible through the Regional Exhibition Touring Boost.



MARIAAN PUGH AND DESMOND TAYLOR: JILA KUJARRA: TWO SNAKES DREAMING Available until August 2025

Jila Kujarra: Two Snakes Dreaming is an exciting cross-cultural collaboration between Warnman artist Desmond Taylor and Boorloo-based textiles practitioner Mariaan Pugh, commissioned by Fremantle Arts Centre in partnership with Martumili Artists.

Taylor and Pugh have worked together to transform Taylor's Niminjarra paintings, usually seen on canvas or paper, into highly tactile textile works, animating the important Niminjarra Jukurrpa (Dreaming).

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BRUNO BOOTH: FELINE GOOD. HOWABOUT BODY SHOTS?

Available until May 2025

Feline Good. Howabout Body Shots? brings together two major works by Bruno Booth, offering insight into the multidisciplinary practice of a significant Western Australian artist.

Body Shots, a nine-channel audio visual installation showing candid views of the disabled body juxtaposed with familiar landscapes and scenes. A foot that looks like no other lies on a bed of green grass, a knobbly, scarred knee rests on a sandy beach gently washed by the tide.

Paired with *Body Shots* is *Feline Good*, a series of day-glo coloured, tracksuit-wearing sculptural cats. These bright and irreverent animal ambassadors are placed in unusual and surprising locations to gently re-orient

the viewer's physical and psychological relationship to space.

Media: 4K Video installation on custom steel frame (all AV supplied), freestanding painted steel and textile sculptures.

Installation: Scale varies: *Body Shots* can be installed as one full installation, as pictured, or split into two or three smaller components.

TINEKE VAN DER EECKEN: TRIBUTARIES

Available until September 2025

Tributaries explores the fibres of flora, fauna, and human systems. It includes jewellery, small fine metal sculptures, and objects formed by corrosion casting, a process by which soft plastics are injected into animal organs and other biological systems to form moulds of internal spaces. Artist: Tineke Van der Eecken

Media: Jewellery, sculpture, photography and text. Several sculptures are fragile and require careful handing


Installation: Between 6 – 8 cabinets with Perspex hoods (provided with exhibition), framed objects and photographic prints on aluminium.

PENNY BOVELL AND GABBY HOWLETT: UNDERNEATH/OVERLOOKED

Postwar Italian immigrants Giuseppe and Anna Scolaro from Capo d'Orlando founded the Universal Tile Factory, once located in Blinco Street Fremantle (c1950-1973). Giuseppe, a skillful and talented artisan, produced a range of decorative terrazzo tiles that combine vibrant mixes of pigment and Italian marble, complex patterns and patinas that become more lustrous with age. Underneath/Overlooked began as a search for the remaining houses and civic buildings still blessed with these special floors and became an art project featuring vibrant reproductions of the Scolaro's tile patters on silk, an interactive patternmaking game, and a photographic record of the lives of those who call these unique spaces home today.



GALUP VR EXPERIENCE

Galup VR Experience explores the transformative impact of truth-telling, examines the destructive nature of colonisation and brings people together for connection and healing.

Created by Noongar theatre-maker Ian Wilkes and artist/filmmaker Poppy van Oorde-Grainger with an oral history from Elder Doolann-Leisha Eatts, this virtual reality (VR) work shines light on a story that's been hidden for almost 200 years. The work is set at Lake Monger, an ancient wetland in the heart of suburban Perth, visited daily by hundreds of people that are unaware of its buried history.
